Homa Arjomand

Homa Arjomand was born in 1952 in Iran and started her political/social activities when she was 17 years old. She studied medical physics in England and has worked as a teacher in various colleges and universities. Since 1970 she has devoted her life fighting for women's rights. In the winter of 1989 she fled Iran through mountains because her life was endangered by the Islamic Regime of Iran. At that time, her daughter was only a year old and her son was 6 years old.

Homa Arjomand has lived in Canada since 1990 and she has attended/ organized countless meeting and international conferences panel discussions and forums on issues related to women's, children's and gay and lesbian rights. She had many interviews for leading newspapers and TV programs in Europe and North America defending secularism. Homa is founder of, Children First Now and the International Campaign against Sharia Court in Canada. She actively participated as a speaker at various conferences to oppose Sharia Court in Canada and the restrictions that political Islam were imposing on women and children. She is a strong advocator of secularism.

In Toronto, Homa, ran a social talk show on Rogers Cable which dealt with children's rights, women's rights, gay and lesbian rights and elder abuse. She has written several articles on these issues. Right now she is working as transitional counsellor for women experiencing domestic violence and work with children who witness abuse or have become victim of abuse. In the Year of 2006 she received the annual Toronto Humanist of the Year award.

On June 17, 2006 Homa received HAC (Humanist Association of Canada) Humanist of The Year Award. Homa also has been recognized as women of the year by Gazette Des Femmes for the year 2005. She became the well known leading person to stop Sharia Court in Canada.

She is the coordinator of The Campaign in Defense of Women's Rights in Iran- Canada www.iranwdw.org ; Spokesperson of Women's liberation and Continues to lead The International Campaign against Sharia Court in Canada www.nosharia.com Homa is the president of Cultural Bridges Association.

The company’s main objective is to produce documentaries about various crucial Palestinian issues, focusing on women’s social and political problems. Khoury received her Bachelor degree in Filmmaking and Photography from the Massachusetts College of Fine Arts in Boston, Massachusetts in the US.

Ms. Khoury has fifteen years of experience in the media field working as the first Palestinian camera women, producer and coordinator covering special events in the Middle East area. She worked for the European Broadcasting

Union (EBU), WTN and other well known European TV stations in Palestine. Ms. Khoury is a dedicated, highly motivated, success oriented and talented individual. *Women in Struggle* (2004), co-produced with Lichtpunt in Belgium and Medea Fund, was Khoury's first documentary as producer, director and cameraperson. Screened worldwide, the documentary was awarded four prizes. Produced in Arabic, it was translated to seven languages.

Hugo Estrella

Hugo was born in Argentina, lifetime secularist. Hugo participated in underground politics during the dictatorship, and with the democratic recovery he became a student leader. For three years he got elected by students as Council member of the faculty of Communication. His activities in science, secularism and social responsibility made him a part of groups such as the Pugwash Conferences on Science and World Affairs, where he founded and was the first chairperson of the Young/Student group (Pugwash holds the 1995 Nobel Peace prize). Then he was a part of INES (International Network of Engineers and Scientists for Global Responsibility, where he is a Council Member since 2000 and was elected for three times as EC Member (INES has UN consultative status).

Hugo got awarded the Golden Charter for Humanism, by the International Academy of Humanist Scientists, in Sarajevo 1998, for his commitment to Peace and Human Rights. He got other several awards in Argentina and

abroad. Founder of the Argentine Humanist and Ethical Association, he was a leader in the struggle for secularism and secular education, as well as full separation of churches and State. He was for some years Latin American delegate of the International Humanist and Ethical Union, and has participated actively in international organized humanism since 1997.

In 2005 he co-founded the International Liaison Committee of Atheist and Freethinkers organizations. Since 2006 He has been co-director of Transnational Programs at the Center for Inquiry/Transnational. He has traveled and lectured extensively promoting secularism and humanism, from India, to Chile, to Russia, where he has also been teaching summer courses for the Moscow state University. He was also founder and the Chairperson of the CFI/Italia, and CFI's head of Mission to the UN in Geneva.

Hugo holds a BA in Social communication and a MA in Management of Intercultural and Interreligious conflicts. His latest work is on the Mystics of Nazi-fascism. He is based in Italy, having been threatened in Argentina, from where he moved in 2006, and got denied a work permit to live in the USA under the Bush Administration (haven't tried again, and don't feel like doing so). **hestrella@centerforinquiry.net**

Parvin Kaboli

Parvin is born and raised in Tehran, Iran. She finished her higher education in teaching. Parvin started her activities for women's rights when she was a teenager. She was one of the founders of teachers' free trade union during the 1979 revolution. Parvin was persecuted and imprisoned for her involvement for equality and freedom when the Islamic Republic came to power.

Following her release, Parvin continued her political activities in Kurdistan. She came to Sweden in 1988 and continued her career in teaching and resumed her activities for women's rights in Sweden. In 1999, she was elected the

chairperson of “International Campaign for Defence of Women’s Rights in Iran”. In this capacity, Parvin endeavoured to disclose the atrocities committed by the Islamic regime in Iran and the situation of women.

Parvin has also a long list of experience in the campaign against “honour killing” and other “cultural” related killings of women and young girls in Sweden. Parvin has written many articles on the above issues in the Swedish newspapers. She is the founder of organisation “Vita Nejlikor” (White Coronations) which was formed after the murder of Fadime Shahindal. Parvin is the Secretary of Organisation for Women’s Liberation. She has recently published a new magazine called “I Heders Namn” (In the name of Honour”.

Azar Majedi

Azar Majedi is born in Iran. She finished her university education abroad and returned to Iran at the time of the revolution against the monarchy in 1978. She became active both politically and in defense of women’s rights while a university student.

Since 1978 she has devoted her life to fighting against the dictatorial regimes in Iran, first the monarchy and then Islamic Republic, fighting for freedom and equality, fighting for women’s rights. She organized an 8 March celebration in 1979. She wrote and translated articles and pamphlets in defense of women’s rights. In 1982 when the Islamic Republic had begun brutal attacks against all the left and opposition groups, torturing and killing thousands, she and her husband were forced to escape from the security forces, and left for Kurdistan. Azar continued her activities, working in a clandestine left Radio as a producer-broadcaster, working as a member of editorial board of a left journal. Azar moved to Europe in 1984. There she continued her activities both as a women’s’ rights activist and as a political activist against the Islamic Republic. She has worked with the International

Campaign for the Defense of Women's Rights in Iran. She co-founded the Center for Women and Socialism. She has published many articles in different journals. She has both organized and participated in different international conferences relating to women's rights issues, political Islam, and wider political issues. She has worked in alternative media; she is the editor of Medusa, a journal dealing with women's issues. For 3 years from 1999-2002, she was the director of Radio International, radio broadcasting into Iran. This can also be heard in Europe and on the internet.

Azar has written numerous articles on women's issues, social and political questions. Many of her articles have been published in various international web sites. She has been interviewed by various international media, BBC, Voice of America, International Herald Tribune, Time magazine, More 4 channel news, Goteborg Posten; she has appeared on ITV, "It's my life" show on the issue of freedom of speech.

She founded the Organization for Women's Liberation - Iran in November 2002, and at present is acting as its chair. She has also founded Mansoor Hekmat foundation in July 2002. She is also a member of the Coordination Committee European Feminist Initiative. She is a member of WUP leadership.

Frances Raday

Frances Raday is Director of the Concord Research Institute for Integration of International Law in Israel at the College of Management and Elias Lieberman Chair in Labour Law at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem (Emerita). She is Honorary Professor at University College London, and has been awarded an honorary doctorate at the University of Copenhagen.

Professor Raday has held an appointment as Expert Member of the UN Committee for the Elimination of Discrimination Against Women. She has held academic appointments at the British Institute of International and Comparative Law, University of East Africa, University of Southern California, University of Tulane and the University of Copenhagen. She has chaired the Academic Committee of the Minerva Center for Human Rights, the Hebrew University's Lafer Center for Women's Studies and the Israeli Association of Feminist and Gender Studies and has been Chief Editor of the Israel Law Review.

Her writings in English include Culture, Religion and Gender; CEDAW'S Substantive Equality and it's Ideological Challengers; Culture, Religion and CEDAW's Article 5(a); Claiming Equal Religious Personhood - Women of

the Wall's Constitutional Saga; Religion, Multiculturalism and Equality - The Israeli Case; Israeli Labor Law, in ABA International Labor and Employment Laws; The Insider-Outsider Politics of Labour-Only Contracting; The Costs of Dismissal - An Analysis in Community Justice and Efficiency; Constitutionalisation of Labour Law?; Privatising Human Rights and the Abuse of Power; Self-Determination and Minority Rights – Israel and Palestine.

She is chief editor and contributing author of the leading textbook on feminist legal theory and development in Israel, *Women's Status in Law and Society* (Hebrew).

As a human rights litigator, Frances Raday was the founding chair of the Legal Centre of the Israel Women's Network. She has appeared as counsel before the High Court of Justice in precedent-setting labour law, human rights and discrimination cases.



Khanum Raheem Lateef

Khanum was born in 1969 in Sulaymaniyah, Iraq, graduate of Institute of Administration. Currently works as Programme Manager of Asuda, an NGO based in Sulaymaniyah and has an office in Erbil and works to combat violence against women since 2 February 2001. Khanum is also founder of Asuda Women Shelter in 2002. She published several booklets and books such as “consequences of violence against women”. She translated several international conventions and documents on women's rights such as CEDAW into Kurdish. Khanum participated in many regional and international conferences and events such as a Conference on Women and Political Participation held in Sulaymaniyah, Iraq 2003, Women Capacity Building Workshop, Amman 2003 organized by the World Bank, Unifem and Women Waging Peace and Women for Women International (Independent Iraqi Women) Conference in Baghdad, 2004 organized by (Independent Iraqi Women), Iraqi Women's strike together with many of Iraqi Women NGOs in Baghdad 2004 against Iraqi Governing Council

[IGC]s Resolution no. 137 regarding Iraqi Personal Status Codes, “Role of Women and Economic Development” conference in Erbil, Workshop on capacity building for women NGOs organized by Counterpart International held in Erbil 2003, member of Amnesty International and had several meetings with AI in Beirut in 2004 on Violence against Women and honor killing, Attend International Conference on Patriarchal Violence against Women organized by the Swedish Government 2003, Stockholm. Khanum also successfully completed a course on Social Work Practice at the Church University of Canterbury at the UK in 2006. Khanum participated in a Study Tour in Johannesburg and Cape Town in South Africa on Reconciliation and Constitution. She also participated in International Conference on violence against women organized by ICDT in Budapest, Hungary. Khanum successfully completed an Internship [New Generation] at Freedom House in the US in 2008.

Khanum was selected as an independent candidate for Iraqi national assembly elections as an independent candidate for 2005 elections. She attended many of the countrywide conferences, workshops and symposiums on women in Baghdad and other Iraqi cities. Khanum participated in awareness campaign for women on participation of women in election. She also participated in campaigning for endorsing 25% quota for women participation in the future legislative authorities in Iraq/National Assembly. Attended Beirut Seminar on Rehabilitation from Violence Trauma organized by Heinrich-Boell Foundation, 2005. Participated in the Seventh International Conference of the Arab Women’s Solidarity Association “Creativity, Dissidence and Women” Cairo, May 2005.

Prior to Asuda, Khanum worked for other governmental and non-governmental institutions, NGOs and international organizations such as: UNDP as Administrative Assistant 2000, UNICEF as Administrator in 1998, NGO QANDIL as Administrative Assistance in 1997.

Khanum was selected as nominee for the US Department of State Women of Courage Award in 2008. Khanum currently studies at the College of Law at the University of Sulaymaniyah.

Our aims

Women's freedom is the measure of freedom in society. There is still a great deal left to accomplish in order to eliminate inequality between men and women, not only in Iran where misogyny brutally rules, but in the most advanced societies as well. The Organisation for Women's Liberation (OWL) sees itself as part of the immense historical and international struggle for women's liberation.

The OWL's aim is the unconditional liberation of women and complete equality between women and men in Iran. The OWL, therefore, must fight for the following demands:

- 1- *Complete equal rights for women and men; abolition of discriminatory laws, particularly laws in relation to family, marriage, divorce, and parental responsibility, for children;*
- 2- *Abolition of compulsory veiling and freedom of dress;*
- 3- *Complete abolition of segregation;*
- 4- *Access to equal resources in education, employment, sports and cultural activities;*
- 5- *Separation of religion from the state and education.*
